In Mexico, as here among us, for some everything goes on as usual, for some plans are being laid, and for some its full speed ahead. For some it is stop and wait. This is where you and I come in. In comparison, economically you and I have been bountifully blessed. What is the minimum wage right now? I had to go to the Internet to find out. As of July 24 of this year it is \$5.85 an hour. That's what many people in Mexico earn per day. So you make plans but without financial support it is very difficult to carry them out. A short term project becomes a long term project or gets dropped all

together. In the meantime it's praying time. They need some of us to join them in daily prayer for some of these projects. Prayer is first on the agenda, not just once but continually. When God's time comes He will give them an answer and God's work will be blessed. These projects may just be waiting for someone here in Texas, Michigan, Arkansas, Missouri, or somewhere else to be touched by the Holy Spirit and to step up to the plate and say, "I want to help." Here are a few or the projects that are in the "praying stage:"



#### Mesias Lutheran Church

Did you ever wonder why there are so many building in Mexico that are only partly built?



You don't or can't get a bank loan so you gather or save what money you can and build as much as you can. You let it set until you are able to get more money. The building pictured above now has the walls up but no roof. When finished this building will have Sunday School


rooms, a kitchen and a bathroom. They want to put on a concrete roof so some day a second floor could be added to the building. The approximate cost of the roof is about 5 to 6 thousand dollars. This is the mission, Mesias (Messiah) in the colonia near Rio Bravo. The colonia does not have paved roads, sewers, or water, but now it does have electricity.

The plans are that Luis Moreno will soon begin, under the guidance of Rev. Isaac Garcia and the Lutheran Synod of Mexico, to serve Mesias as Lay-minister. He is in the process of taking courses

Brownsville and McAllen from the Hispanic Institute of Theology under the tutelage of Rev. Steven Morfitt and Rev. Roberto Simental. Again they are going to need our continuing support to implement this ministry.


